BLAKE

THE BLAKE SCHOOL is an independent, nonsectarian, pre-kindergarten through grade twelve co-educational day school. Founded in 1900, the school has campuses in Hopkins, Minneapolis and Wayzata. The Upper School, enrolling 530 students, is located near downtown Minneapolis. The student teacher ratio is 8:1 and the average class size of 15 allows faculty and administrators to know each student individually. 75% of the Upper School faculty hold advanced degrees. Four members of the Upper School faculty are published authors; two are AP readers.

ACCREDITATION is by the Independent School Association of the Central States. The school holds membership in the National Association of Independent Schools, the Cum Laude Society, the College Board and the National Association for College Admission Counseling.

ADMISSION is selective and based on examinations, records and personal interviews. Students come from 59 communities in the Twin Cities metropolitan area. 22% of our students receive need-based financial assistance.

THE BLAKE CURRICULUM offers a rigorous college preparatory program with core graduation requirements in five academic disciplines as well as the arts. Twenty-two credits must be earned in grades nine through twelve.

Honors courses (AP or Honors) are offered in all disciplines.

Fifteen Advanced Placement courses are offered.

Courses beyond AP: Most juniors take AP English Literature and Composition and all senior English electives are taught at a post - AP level. Readings in Applied and Pure Mathematics, LeMonde Francophone: Advanced Culture and Literature, Advanced Hispanic Culture and Literature also are offered. Several students participate in the University of Minnesota's Talented Youth Mathematics Program (UMTYMP) and earn college credit for the mathematics taken there.

Global Online Academy: The Blake School is a participating member of the Global Online Academy, a consortium of the world's leading independent schools whose mission is to translate into online classrooms the intellectually rigorous programs and excellent teaching that are hallmarks of its member schools.

Every senior is required to take Senior Seminar and deliver an assembly speech before the entire Upper School community.

GLOBAL PROGRAMS AT BLAKE

Global citizenship and cultural competence are emphasized throughout the academic curriculum, and students have the opportunity each year to participate in a 12- or 21-day global immersion program. Students are also encouraged to consider semester or year-long study abroad opportunities. While involved in Blake-sponsored travel and immersion, intentional efforts are made to help students develop leadership skills, empathy, cultural competency and resilience. In recent years, students have studied and traveled to Vietnam, Cuba, Sierra Leone, China, Rwanda, India and Mexico. Upon returning, students are expected to formally and informally share their experiences with the larger community through presentations, exhibits and shared media.

GRADING/TESTING: We do not weigh grades nor do we rank students. In the past four years, the mid 50% grade point on a 4.00 scale has been 3.24 – 3.78. The mid 50% of SAT scores have been 1340 – 1510, and the ACT Composite has been 28 – 33.

GRADE POINT AVERAGE is based on a four-point scale, including all Blake courses beginning in ninth grade. Only classes taken at Blake during the academic year are included in the GPA. Summer courses, college classes or other academic work may be listed on the transcript but are not included in the grade point average. *Honors, AP, and CIS courses are not weighted.*



DISTRIBUTION OF ACT SCORES



RECENT AWARDS AND SPECIAL RECOGNITION:

- Blake teams won the following athletic state championships: girls' track and field, girls' tennis (fourth consecutive year), boys' soccer, boys' tennis (only team to win back-to-back titles in Class A one year and Class AA the next year), Wolfpack football (combined Blake, St. Paul Academy and Minnehaha Academy), Blake/Breck boys' swim and dive (second consecutive year). Sixteen Blake student-athletes from the class of 2018 went on to compete in intercollegiate athletics at the Division 1 and Division 111 levels in 10 different sports.
- A Blake student was recognized as state debater of the year at the Minnesota Debate Tournament, and another was named to the National Speech Debate Team. Five Blake students earned the National Speech and Debate Association's Academic All-American award.
- Four Blake girls' hockey players were recognized by the Hennepin County Board of Commissioners for raising over \$100,000 to combat sex trafficking.
- A Blake student was named one of five National Student Poets. A Blake student won first place in Minnesota's state competition for Poetry Out Loud and represented Minnesota at the Poetry Out Loud National Competition in Washington, D.C.
- A Blake student was named a national silver medalist in the National Scholastic Art Awards competition, and another was selected for the 2018 High School Honors Performance Series at Carnegie Hall.
